Joining Forces for Advocacy

North Star, an initiative designed by Superintendent of Schools Sean Bulson, Ed. From Meghan Kissell, the Senior Director of Policy and Membership Advocacy at the American Association of University Women (AAUW).

I wanted to share that AAUW has joined 126 other gender justice, survivor advocacy, and civil rights organizations in letter to the Biden Administration calling for immediate action to finalize the Department of Education's (the Department's) Title IX rule. As you may know, AAUW submitted comments on two sets of proposed rules to strengthen the civil rights protections offered by Title IX. The Administration originally stated that the new rules would be released in October, however, there continues to be delays. The new rules are expected to:

- Restore protections from sex-based discrimination;
- Clarify protections for LGBTQ students;
- Strengthen supports for pregnant and parenting students;
- Ensure appropriate implementation of religious exemptions; and
- Provide clarity on transgender students participation in athletics.

Fallopian Tube Cancer & Ovarian Cancer

Recent publications from the Physician Data Query (PDQ) of the National Cancer Institute (National Institutes of Health) and the Cleveland Clinic have documented the connection between the two cancers. Moreover, both institutions have cautioned women that ovarian cancer may have begun in the fallopian tubes. "The most common type of ovarian cancer (high grade serous carcinoma or epithelial) may begin as fallopian tube cancer." It "develops at the end of the fallopian tube where eggs enter from an ovary." Then it spreads to the ovary, and "may account for up to 70% of all epithelial ovarian cancers."

Unfortunately, symptoms/signs of fallopian tube cancer are shared with other common body problems: Abdominal pain or bloating, abnormal menstruation, chronic back pain, constipation, fatigue, frequent urination, painful intercourse, pelvic pain or mass, upset stomach (indigestion), watery or bloody vaginal discharge.

Important diagnostic tests begin with a pelvic exam and will be followed by: blood tests, imaging scans, paracentesis (when there is a buildup of peritoneal fluid in the abdomen (ascites), and a biopsy.

"Avoiding risk factors and increasing protective factors may help prevent cancer." To wit: Risks: family history, inherited risk, hormone replacement therapy, weight and height, endometriosis. Protective: oral contraceptives, tubal ligation, giving birth, salpingectomy (surgical removal of the fallopian tubes), breast-feeding, and risk reducing salpingo-oophorectomy (fallopian tube and ovary removal).

This is a very short piece about a very important killer. It is a rare gynecological cancer. However, having the BRCA1 or BRCA2 gene, or other genes, may be a factor in developing fallopian tube cancer as well as having a family history of ovarian cancer. More at these sites:
